As **Chancellor** of the Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE), I serve as chief executive officer and oversee, under the authority of an elected board of regents, a complex system that includes R-1 research universities, four-year undergraduate institutions, a research institute and community colleges. During my tenure, I have accumulated an impressive record on multiple measurable dimensions of success centered on increased accessibility, student success and expanded workforce training and education.

Notable accomplishments during my tenure include:

- 1) establishing a set of five strategic goals, along with a set of metrics, aimed at increasing access, improving student success, closing the achievement gap, addressing workforce needs and increasing solution-focused research;
- 2) expanding access to higher education and increasing the number of online programs offered by our degree granting institutions including partnering with the MGM Resorts International Inc., Nevada's largest employer (80,000+ employees nationwide) to grant their employees' free access to online programs (This is the first time a Fortune 500 company has partnered with an entire system of higher education, including its research universities and community colleges to provide free access to higher education);
- 3) having the Board of Regents adopt 2025 goals for graduation and year-to-year persistence rates for all our seven degree-granting institutions;
- 4) eliminating remedial education at all NSHE institutions and mandating corequisite support;
- 5) instituting a fee waiver for foster care youth and securing free housing for these youth attending higher education in the Las Vegas valley;
- 6) initiating two partnerships in Mexico aimed at trans-boundary research opportunities and student education & exchanges;
- 7) increasing leadership diversity throughout NSHE including the hiring of four Hispanic and one African-America Presidents;
- 8) developing a strategic partnership with K-12 focused on creating stronger and more robust pathways from high school in career and technical education (CTE);
- 9) negotiating a multiyear agreement with Nevada Energy, the public utility company, that saves NSHE \$380,000 in annual energy costs statewide and includes having Nevada Energy pay NSHE \$500,000 for five years to retain it as a customer. These payments will be used toward student success initiatives focused on improving graduation and persistence rates at the eight institutions NSHE oversees;
- 10) brokering an agreement with Operation Hope to place financial coaches at NSHE institutions to assist students with financial literacy;
- 11) consolidating police operations for all campuses in southern Nevada (four institutions) into one command structure resulting in a better coordinated and more efficient level of safety and security across all campuses (this command structure was named fourth in the nation for campus safety by Safe Campus in 2020); and
- 12) strengthening the transfer and articulation process for students by auditing every single regional transfer agreement, hiring the first statewide Transfer and Articulation Ombudsperson to assist transfer students with any challenges and establishing the Articulation Coordinating Committee to mediate disagreements between institutions to ensure seamless transfers.

As **Director/Professor** of the Morrison Institute for Public Policy (a non-partisan policy think tank), I was responsible for the direction, oversight and administration of the Institute including securing funding and contracts to ensure its successful operation; identifying key policy areas; building relationships with governmental officials; non-profits and business leaders; identifying areas for regional research and impact; and development key metrics to measure outcomes. In addition to the following strategic policy areas: education, water, governance, immigration, human services, demographics and the economy; the Institute included two Centers: The Kyl Center for Water Policy and the Latino Public Policy Center. I

was responsible for securing a \$1 M gift to create the Kyl Center for Water Policy. I also am tenured as a Professor in the School of Public Affairs.

As **Professor/Director** for the School of Social Work at San Diego State University, I was responsible for oversight and administration of the School's budget and day-to-day operations. I was also responsible for securing extramural funding and guiding the educational, professional and research mission of the School. The School offers a BA in Social Work; BS in Gerontology; an MSW with concentrations in Direct Practice and Administration; MS in Gerontology; dual-degree programs: MSW/MPA and MSW/JD; and an Interdisciplinary joint PhD degree in Alcohol and Drug Studies with the University of California, San Diego (UCSD) School of Medicine. The School also operates three centers: Center for Alcohol & Drug Studies, Consensus Organizing Center, and the Academy for Professional Excellence. During my tenure I increased extramural funding, most notably in several key areas such as child welfare, mental health, American Indian recruitment activities and the permanent funding of the Imperial Valley MSW program . Since 2009, I served as the Principal Investigator for over \$11 Million in external funding. Additionally, I successfully established a unique applied Joint Doctoral Program with the University of California , San Diego (UCSD); School of Medicine in Substance.

As **President/CEO** for The Reilly Group, I was the lead for a strategic management consulting firm with public and non-profit organizations to provide objective advice based on critical analysis and relevant experience. Focus is on assessing communication, structure and resource management by conducting:

As **Corporate Vice President of Social Responsibility** for Caesars Entertainment, Inc., I was responsible for managing and developing global social responsibility and corporate philanthropy programs. I also served as the Executive Director for the Caesar's Foundation, a separate 501(c) 3, operating internationally.

As **Vice-Chancellor, Health Sciences System**, I was responsible for coordinating the health and medical programs of the state's two universities and five colleges with those of the medical care community throughout the state of Nevada.

As **County Manager/CEO** for Clark County, Nevada (the Las Vegas Valley), I was responsible for the executive oversight of a government that provides both regional and municipal-type services to over 1.8 million residents (44 million tourists per year) and overseeing 12,000

employees). As the County's chief executive officer, I was charged with carrying out the policies established by the seven-member Board of County Commissioners. I was responsible for the fiscal management of the County's \$5.8 billion budget. I provide administrative oversight for 38 diverse and geographically dispersed departments. During my tenure I was known for innovative governance practices including instituting increased transparency in the budgeting process and creating a host of citizen involvement/engagement activities; establishing a pay-for performance compensation system for employees; championing regional governance efforts in the area of business license, air quality, homelessness and planning; initiating an enterprise performance management and measurement program to ensure that County's services, strategic plan, budget, performance and results were integrated; and restructuring the tax rate components in the county budget that increased the County's flexibility in addressing indigent and homeless program and services .

As **Associate Professor** of the School of Social Work, I taught both undergraduate and graduate level courses and served as Chair, Admissions, Master of Social Work Program; Chair, Administration, Practice and Planning Sequence and as Member of the Child Welfare Sequence; Policy Sequence; PhD Planning Committee; Faculty Senate Committee, and Priority and New Program Review.

As **Director of Clark County Administrative Services**, I served as the chief administrative officer and was responsible for administering and planning Clark County's legislative and intergovernmental initiatives, franchise agreements, emergency management, policy and program development, and strategic planning efforts.

As **Deputy Administrator** for the Nevada Division of Child and Family Services, I was responsible for the administration of child welfare services (Centralized Intake/Assessment, Family Preservation, Child Protective Services, Substitute Care, and Adoptions) for the State of Nevada. Responsible for development and presentation of legislation, ordinance, proposed budgets and policy to the federal government, state legislature, county commission, and relevant committees.

As the **Deputy Administrator** for the Welfare Division, I had responsibilities for Income Maintenance programs (Aid for Families with Dependent Children, Food Stamps and Emergency Assistance), Employment and Training services, Refugee services, and Adult Protective and Homemaker services.
